THE GARBAGE MIRACLE

Isaiah 61:1

Florida has many beautiful things about it — great beaches, great theme parks, great weather, but to be perfectly honest, Florida is not one of the most exciting states to drive across. We're talking about terminal flatness here.

There's nothing wrong with the South Florida landscape that a nice mountain, or even a hill, wouldn't liven things up a bit. Well, in West Palm Beach there is one. A hill, that is. It actually rises to the breathtaking height of 55 feet above sea level. I know that people who live in that area love to go hiking on and around this beautiful hill. It's wonderfully landscaped . . . there's some water there . . . some biking, hiking, jogging trails . . . recreational areas.

Now anyone who knows the topography of South Florida would wisely ask, "Where did this hill come from?" And the answer is: from Garbage! Yep! This lovely spot used to be an ugly, old landfill.

But someone had the brilliant idea of making something useful, something even beautiful of what had just been a lot of garbage.

Well, I want to have A WORD WITH YOU this month about

The GARBAGE MIRACLE.

It's amazing how they, out of garbage, made something they could have never had otherwise. Actually, that's the kind of miracle God loves to do with some of the foulest experiences of our lives. In our word for this week from the Word of God in Isaiah 61:1 and following, we read this description of Jesus. "The Lord has sent me to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim freedom for the captives, and release from darkness for the prisoners . . . to comfort all who mourn, and provide for those who grieve in Zion."

Now, Jesus comes to do something with the things in our life that, well, we would see only as trash — a broken heart, a physical or emotional prison, a season of darkness, things that make us mourn and grieve, but listen to the amazing beauty Jesus can create from this ugly garbage.

God says He will "bestow on them a crown of beauty instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, and a garment of praise instead of a spirit of despair. They will be (now, remember, 'they' here are the broken, damaged, hurting people) ... THEY will be called oaks of righteousness, a planting of the Lord, for the display of His splendor." Out of life's garbage, something glorious unto the Lord will be done!

Office Closed 9/2 Labor Day Home Visitor Cut off date 9/16 You may be looking at your pain and seeing only a mountain of stinking, useless trash, but Jesus is looking at it like some engineers and landscapers must have looked at that landfill in Florida — seeing some beautiful things God can make from that brokenness and hurt, things you could never have on the landscape of your life if it weren't for the garbage transformed through Jesus' design.

Your Savior wants to take the pain that could make you a bitter person and use it to make you a compassionate person, because you know what hurt or slavery is like, you know how it feels . . . and you have the credentials and the sensitivity to be one of God's **wounded healers**. Jesus uses these hard things that could make you move farther from Him to draw you deeper into His love and compassion than you ever thought possible.

There's an intimacy and power with God experienced by the hurting people that the "whole" people might never touch. Through his almost unbearable suffering, Job said this to God, "My ears had heard of You, but now my eyes have seen You" (Job 42:5).

Jesus can use the pain to deeply bond you, not only to Himself, but to other people — if you'll reach out instead of in. Some of life's closest relationships are forged in the furnace of suffering. And your Lord can use the things you have hated in your life to bring wholeness for another. Through your witness to God's loving-kindness and faithfulness, they might consider <u>your Savior</u>, because they heard about Jesus from you, someone who knows what it means to really need **the Savior**.

Beauty from ashes . . . praise from despair . . . something very special from something very ugly.

If you will let Jesus be the Lord of your life's pile of garbage, He can make from your life a mountain from which many will be able to see and enjoy Him.

On July 20 a group of 15 gathered for a time of interactive prayer at the Me, Myself & God Prayer Event. Participants were given six different stations and ways to meet God in prayer.

Station one, OBPC Church & Family, invited them to take time to reflect on the church we call home and the people we call family. After taking time to do that and read the scripture provided, each person wrote down people, moments, or things on a strip of paper that they prayed for at OBPC. Then they placed the colored papers into the cross provided. Finally, they took a moment to pray about the things they listed and give them to God.





Station two, Confessions, asked the participants to think about concerns, regrets, or sins, sum it up into one word, write the word in the sand provided, and reflect on it for a moment. They repeated as many times as needed. Once they completed this task, they were instructed to use a sugar scrub at the sink that acted as the grains of sand or sin mixing with God's grace. Upon rinsing the scrub off, they were left only with renewed skin that reminds us of the renewal we have in God's love and forgiveness.

Station three, Reflection, told everyone to take time looking at themselves in a mirror, truly seeing themselves as God the Father does.

They were then given a small mirror to write one word on that tells what God loves most about them. Then they were told to take the mirror with them as a reminder.





Station four, Praise, was a reflective and meditative room filled with candles. Each person was ask to remember people, events, or things from their pasts that have been gifts from God that lit their spiritual paths. After they had spent time thinking, praying, and reading the scripture, they lit a candle in praise for the moments and people who have been the light of Christ in their lives.

Station five, Global Prayer, asked the individual to think outside of their home area and into the world around them. To mission partners around the world or places in the world that need God's presence. They were given a small globe keychain to hold as they prayed the finger prayer with each finger representing something different: People who are ill, people who need to experience God's love, people in power, people who lead, and people far away.

Station six, Burdens, invited the participants to take a brick provided, carry it through the labyrinth, and talk to God about the burdens they carried in life. Once they returned from the labyrinth they were told to take one of the small stones provided and a paint pen to write a word of phrase that God communicated to them during their walk.





At the end of the event everyone gathered together in the narthex to hold hands and pray around the circle about anything that was on their hearts. Overall, this was a very powerful and moving time together with God.



OUTREACH SPOTLIGHT-

SECOND HARVEST FOOD BANK

September is **Hunger Action Month** – the Feeding America Network's annual campaign to raise awareness of hunger in the United States and to take action to combat poverty, inequity, and injustice so hunger can end for good.

The Second Harvest Food Bank is asking for locals to help "Stock the Shelves" throughout September. According to the non-profit organization, the food bank distributes enough food for 250,000 meals every day and it's not enough.

In honor of **Hunger Action Month**, Outreach is challenging our congregation to help fight hunger in our community. This month-long effort encourages OBPC to make a positive change in our community whether that's by donating, advocating, volunteering or learning more about hunger.

Critical Need Items

- Fruits: Canned fruit (in its own juice, no sugar added varieties), dried fruit, 100% fruit juice
- Vegetables: Canned vegetables (reduced salt/no salt varieties), 100% vegetable juice, spaghetti sauce
- Grains: Rice, pasta, crackers (whole-grain varieties), ready-to-eat cereal (low sugar/high-fiber), oatmeal
- **Protein Foods**: Canned meat/poultry, canned tuna/salmon (packed in water), canned/dry beans & peas (low/no salt varieties), peanut butter
- Dairy/Dairy Alternatives: Non fat dry Milk, evaporated milk, soymilk
- Meals: Beef stew, canned soup (reduced sodium varieties), chili, other canned meals
- Other: Nutritional drinks (ex: Ensure, Boost)
- **Baby Food**: Must be in complete, undamaged original packaging. No individual serving glass or plastic containers unless in an unopened case.
- **Non-food Items**: Diapers, toiletries (soap, shampoo, shaving cream, etc.). Must be unopened and stored separate from food donations.

Please remember the special needs of infants and toddlers:

Infants

- Powdered infant milk or soy-based formulas (WIC-approved preferred)
- Baby cereal
- Baby fruits (single ingredient preferred)
- Baby vegetables (single ingredient preferred)
- Baby Meats (no meat sticks)

Toddlers

- Shelf-stable white whole milk for 1-year olds; Shelf-stable 1% (low fat) or skim milk for 2 year olds and up; Shelf-stable soy milk.
- Canned fruits, preferably packed in juice with no added sugar
- Canned vegetables, preferably low sodium or no salt added
- Canned beans such as black, red, pink, pinto beans, black-eyed peas, pigeon peas, garbanzos
- Shelf stable foods designed for toddlers such as Stage 3, Graduates, etc.
